<u>Beyond Medication and Television: Using Positive Behavioral Supports in an Inpatient Setting</u> (Introductory) – Dr. Snyder

After completing this session, participants will be able to:

- Define positive and negative reinforcement and give examples of each;
- List and discuss the drawbacks of punishment as a treatment approach; and
- Describe 2 ways positive reinforcement can be implemented in an inpatient setting.

Intersectionality of Identity (Introductory) - Drs. Shallcross & Snyder

- Describe identity theory and its evolution;
- Explain minority stress theory and how to apply to current practices; and
- Discuss the SHARP model to address the intersection of identities.

<u>Introduction to Recovery-Oriented Care</u> (Introductory) – Dr. Robertson

- Describe at least 1 way in which a recovery-oriented case formulation differs from a case formulation driven by the medical model

- List at least 3 evidence-based interventions that are consistent with the PSR approach to treatment of people with serious mental illness.
