There will be a focus on recent changes to the structure of psychological and neuropsychological CPT codes and appropriately applying the codes when billing for services. A suggested model for documenting services provided will be presented. There will also be time allotted so that attendee questions can be addressed.

8:00AM Upper Pavilion  1.0 CE Hrs	<u>OPTUM IDAHO &amp; IBHP SYSTEM TRANSFORMATION</u> – <i>Dennis Woody, PhD</i> This presentation will address Optum Idaho's responses to the needs of Medicaid membership and the changes to the Idaho Behavioral Health Plan (IBHP). A general review of the requirements of the YES system of care and a discussion of its operational elements potentially impacting psychological practices. Specific content outlining changing requirements for care of Medicaid members will be discussed along with the components for functional assessment (CANS) and treatment planning having a child/family-based focus. Additionally, the development of community supports and member/stakeholder relationships will be discussed with an outline of future emphases for mental health awareness in Idaho. Finally, Idaho psychologist practice patterns and the nature of program development within the regions of Idaho will be reviewed.

9:15AM Upper Pavilion  1.0 CE Hrs	<u>TELEPSYCH &amp; PSYPACT</u> - <i>Alex Siegel, JD, PhD</i> The presentation will cover the need and rationale for allowing psychologists to use electronic communications inter-jurisdictionally to provide telepsychological services ethically and legally to patients. It will briefly examine the APA Guidelines on Telepsychology with particular focus on competency, informed consent and confidentiality and security of the data as well as the ASPPB Standards on Telepsychology. The presentation will explore the obstacles for interjurisdictional telepsychology practice and offer solutions for the ethical and legal interjurisdictional practice and provide a discussion of ASPPB's E.Passport and the Psychology Interjurisdictional Compact, PSYPACT.

10:30AM Upper Pavilion  3.0 CE Hrs	<u>ACCEPTANCE &amp; COMMITMENT THERAPY (ACT) IN THE TREATMENT OF COMPULSIVE DISORDERS</u> - <i>Cameron Staley, PhD</i> This 3-hour training will provide an 8 session ACT framework for addressing compulsive disorders. Recent research has found ACT effective in treating compulsive disorders including OCD, Trichotillomania, and skin picking, as well as other compulsive behaviors such as unwanted pornography viewing. Participants will identify ACT techniques and skills to integrate into their current practice, apply these concepts in the context of compulsive behaviors, utilize metaphors and exercises to help clients make connections between principles and problematic behaviors, and prepare effective ways to track process-oriented outcomes such as awareness, flexibility, and values.

# ABOUT OUR SPEAKERS



## Antonio Puentes

Antonio E. Puentes, PhD, Professor of Psychology at the University of North Carolina Wilmington (UNCW), was the 2017 president of the 117,000-member American Psychological Association (founded in 1892). Born in Cuba and emigrated to the US, Dr. Puentes received his General Education from Florida Junior College, undergraduate in psychology from the University of Florida and his master's and doctorate from the University of Georgia. He has lectured in 20 foreign countries and holds appointments as a visiting professor at the Universidad de Granada (Spain) and University of California in Los Angeles.

He has taught at UNCW since 1981 and prior to that at St. George's University School of Medicine (neuroanatomy). His primary teaching activities include Brain and Behavior, Clinical Neuropsychology and History of Psychology. Dr. Puentes is founding director of UNCW's Centro Hispano. His research focuses on the interface between culture and neuropsychology. Dr. Puentes founded and edited the journals *Neuropsychology Review* and *Journal of Interprofessional Education & Practice* as well as a book series (33 books) in neuropsychology. He is the author of 8 books, 80 book chapters and 110 journal articles.

Dr. Puentes was a Fulbright Scholar in 1983 to Argentina. He received the APA's Distinguished Professional Contributions to Independent Practice in 2011. He has been a member of the APA since 1978 and fellow of ten divisions. He has also served as president of the N.C. Psychological Association, N.C. Psychological Foundation, the Hispanic Neuropsychological Society, National Academy of Neuropsychology, and Society for Clinical Neuropsychology (Division 40 of APA). In 2019, Dr. Puentes will begin serving on the Board of Directors of the American Psychological Foundation.

## Dennis Woody

Dennis J. Woody, PhD, is the Senior Clinical Program Consultant for Optum Idaho after serving as the Clinical Director since 2013. Prior to joining Optum Idaho, he maintained a private clinical neuropsychology practice focused on adolescents/children with brain injury sequelae, neurobehavioral problems, learning disabilities and neurodevelopmental issues. In tandem with his private practice, Dr. Woody consulted for the State of Idaho, Dept. of Health & Welfare System and the Meridian/Boise Independent School Districts as a pediatric neuropsychologist. He also practiced at St. Luke's Hospital, the Mountain States Tumor Institute (Peds) and Idaho Elk's Rehabilitation before joining Optum Idaho.

Dr. Woody is a member of the Neuropsychology, Rehabilitation Psychology and Psychopharmacology divisions of APA, as well as a member of IPA. He received B.S. degrees in both Elementary Education and Child Development from the University of Idaho, as well as a B.A. in Psychology and a Master's in Clinical Psychology from the University of Montana. He completed his doctorate in Clinical Psychology at the University of Montana. Immediately following his doctoral work and clinical internship with the U.S. Army, he completed a post-doctoral fellowship in clinical neuropsychology at the University of Minnesota Schools and Hospital.



## Alex Siegel

Alex M. Siegel, JD, PhD, is an attorney and clinical psychologist. Three different Pennsylvania Governors (Ridge, Schweiker and Rendell) appointed Dr. Siegel to the Pennsylvania State Board of Psychology. He served on the Board for 13 years, six as Chair of the State Board. Dr. Siegel was elected to the Board of Directors of the Association of State and Provincial Psychology Boards (ASPPB). He was also elected President of ASPPB in 2008. Currently, Dr. Siegel is the Director of Professional Affairs (DPA) for ASPPB. In his role as DPA, he serves as a liaison between ASPPB and state and national psychological associations. He provides training to new members of psychology licensing boards in the U.S. and the colleges of psychology in Canada. He was staff to the APA/ASPPB/APAIT joint task force on telepsychology and to the ASPPB task force on regulations for interjurisdictional telepsychological practice. He is a member of the PSYPACT task force. He is also a member of ASPPB Supervision Guidelines task force and Chair of the Model Act and Regulations Committee (MARC). In addition, Dr. Siegel consults with state governments, attorneys, courts and maintains a small clinical and forensic practice.



## Cameron Staley

Cameron Staley, PhD, BCB, is a psychologist and group coordinator at Idaho State University Counseling and Testing Service. He provides individual, couple, and group therapy to university students. He is the only board-certified biofeedback practitioner in the state of Idaho. Dr. Staley teaches graduate and undergraduate courses for the psychology department on psychological assessment, clinical practicum, and abnormal psychology. He supervises graduate students from both the Clinical Psychology PhD and Master's Counseling programs at ISU.

He has presented his research on compulsive sexual behaviors at the International Academy of Sex Research (IASR) and the Society for the Scientific Study of Sexuality (SSSS) along with peer-reviewed publications in the journals of Socioaffective Neuroscience and Psychology, Sexual Addiction & Compulsivity, and Archives of Sexual Behavior.

Dr. Staley completed his psychology internship at Brigham Young University's Counseling and Psychological Services where he first received training in Acceptance and Commitment Therapy (ACT). He continues to enjoy providing individual and group therapy for compulsive behaviors and offering professional training on ACT and sexual concerns.


